

PLENARY SPEAKER

XVIII Plenary Speaker: Dr. Gene Edward Veith, Jr.

Dr. Gene Edward Veith, Jr., is a writer and a retired literature professor. He is Provost Emeritus at Patrick Henry College and the Director of the Cranach Institute at Concordia Theological Seminary in Ft. Wayne, Indiana. He previously served as Culture Editor of WORLD MAGAZINE and Professor of English and Dean of the School of Arts & Sciences at Concordia University Wisconsin. He is the author of over 20 books, including *Postmodern Times: A Christian Guide to Contemporary Thought and Culture*, The Spirituality of the Cross: The Way of the First Evangelicals, Classical Education, and God at Work: Your Christian Vocation in All of Life.

Dr. Veith was born in Oklahoma in 1951. He graduated from the University of Oklahoma in 1973 and received a Ph.D. in English from the University of Kansas in 1979. He was given an honorary doctorate from Concordia Theological Seminary in 2005 and from Concordia University California in 2014. He has taught at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College and was a Visiting Professor at Wheaton College, Gordon College, and Regent College (Vancouver). He was also a Visiting Lecturer at the Estonian Institute of Humanities in Tallinn, Estonia. He and his wife Jackquelyn have three grown children and twelve grandchildren. They live in Blackwell, Oklahoma.

Dr. Veith will present, during his three-day Plenary, Classical Lutheran Education: The Past, Classical Lutheran Education: The Present, and Classical Lutheran Education: The Future.

XVIII Banquet Speaker: Dr. E. Christian Kopff

SESSION 1: Tuesday, July 17, 10:15 - 11:00

E. Christian Kopff is a graduate of Haverford College PA (B.A., summa cum laude) and received his doctorate in Classics from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He has taught at the University of Colorado, Boulder since 1973, where he has been Associate Director of the Honors Program since 1990. From Fall 2004 to 2011 he served as Founding Director of the Center for Western Civilization at CU-Boulder. He is the founding faculty father of the CU-Boulder Honors Journal, which is the elite undergraduate publication for the university.

He is a Fellow of the American Academy in Rome and has twice been awarded grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities. He is editor of a critical edition of the Greek text of *Euripides' Bacchae* (Teubner, 1982) and author of over 100 articles and reviews on scholarly, pedagogical and popular topics, including *Introductions to Herbert Jordan's translations of Homer's Iliad* (2008) and *Odyssey* (2014). For ISIBooks he wrote *The Devil Knows Latin: Why America Needs the Classical Tradition* (1999) and translated Josef Pieper, *Tradition: Concept and Claim* (2008). He studies and teaches the influence of classical education in modernity and texts and traditions, from science to Sophocles, that arose in the ancient world and remain important and influential today, including the tradition of consensual self-rule, which the Greeks called democracy, and the religion of the Bible

This year, Dr. Kopff will present *The Wittenberg Option*: The best response to the hostile worldview contemporary Christians often face may be modeled best not by medieval monasteries, but by the little city of Wittenberg in the first decade of the Reformation.
